


We have been really busy over the last month. Read on to find out what we have been up to!

What do the children say they've enjoyed learning about?

<u>In Key Stage 1,</u> Oliver from Goldfinch Class said:

Forest School

The first block of Forest School has now finished with children from Robins, Kingfishers, Goldfinches, Puffins, Buzzards and Red Kites all enjoying sessions in our constantly evolving site. Now it is the turn of Wagtails, Pipits, Merlins, Harriers, Kestrels and Sparrowhawks children.

Forest school is a child led experience where they can do as much or as little as they want. They choose their activities and go at their own speed. We offer inspirational craft ideas to spark the imagination and let the children explore the possibilities, with support if they ask for it.

The sessions have introduced the children to wood working tools such as bow saws, hack saws, hand drills, brace drills and vegetable peelers for whittling. The year 6's have also learned how to use woodworking knives safely. Fires have been lit using fire steels and the children have enjoyed cooking popcorn and marshmallows whilst telling stories. For many, the mud kitchen has been an opportunity to get messy and use their wonderful imaginations. We have also had some fantastic dens made of pallets, tarps, rope and tree branches.

Forest school encourages independence and resilience through praise and the children get an amazing sense of achievement when they succeed at tasks they found challenging. Using the fire steel effectively and tying knots are tricky activities for many, but we have already witnessed some very happy children when persistence has been rewarded.

Please do make sure the children have warm waterproof clothing and footwear as we head into winter so we can avoid wet feet and shivering children!

Can you help?! We are looking for the following items for our Forest School:

- * Wheels old bike wheels or pram wheels for construction of go-carts
 - * Buttons for Christmas crafts
- * Foam or rubber mats to line the floor of the tent and make it warmer for sitting on.
 - Large shrub or tree branches or prunings we can use for dens and crafts


