King Ina Church of England Academy English Reading Progression of Skills KS1/KS2

Our curriculum approach to English reflects our vision statement: Within our secure Christian environment, our vision is to develop healthy, happy, motivated learners who aspire to achieve their full potential and who look to the future with confidence.

The reading comprehension progression for Years 1 to 6 at King Ina Church of England Academy will - in the most part follow the National Curriculum developmental stages. The content will often be driven by the termly and half-termly topics with teachers weaving in the skills below and themes as recommended by the Somerset Literacy Network.

<u>Year 1</u>

Develop pleasure in reading and motivation to read, expanding vocabulary and understanding by listening to and discussing a wide range of poems, stories and nonfiction at a level beyond which they can read themselves and linking what they read themselves, or hear read to them, to their own experiences. Becoming very familiar with key stories, fairy tales and traditional tales, recognising and joining in with predictable phrases. Discussing the meanings of new words and linking them to words already known. Learning to appreciate rhymes and poems and recite some by heart.

<u>Year 2</u>

Develop pleasure in reading and motivation to read, expanding vocabulary and understanding by listening to and discussing a wide range of modern and classic poetry, stories and non-fiction at a level beyond which they can read themselves.

Discuss sequences of events in books and how content of non-fiction texts is related, becoming familiar with and re-telling a range of stories, fairy tales and traditional stories and recognise simple recurring literary language patterns.

Becoming aware of a range of non-fiction books which are structured in different ways.

Discuss and clarify meanings of new words, favourite words and phrases. Continue to build up a repertoire of poems learnt by heart.

Year 3 and 4

Develop positive attitudes to reading and understanding of what they have read by listening to and discussing a wide range of fiction, poetry, plays, non-fiction and reference or text books. Reading books that are structured in different ways and for different purposes, using dictionaries to check the meaning of new words they have read and increasing their familiarity with a wide range of books including fairy stories, myths and legends.

Preparing poems and plays to read aloud and perform showing understanding through intonation, tone, volume and actions and recognising different forms of poetry including narrative, free verse and syllabic styles.

Identify themes and conventions in a wide range of books and discuss words and phrases that capture the reader's interest and imagination

Year 5 and 6

Maintain positive attitudes to reading and understanding what they have read by continuing to read and discuss an increasingly wide range of fiction, poetry, plays, nonOfiction and reference or text books. Read books that are structured in different ways and which have a range of purposes including myths, legends, traditional tales, modern fiction, fiction from our literary heritage and that of other cultures. Recommend books they have read to their peers giving reasons for choices, identify themes and conventions across a wide range of writing, and discuss comparisons and contrast between books.

Learn a wider range of poetry by heart and preparing poems and plays to perform with an awareness of the audience.
